Since its inception, workplace injuries and illnesses are down from an average of 10.9 incidents per 100 workers in the 70s to 2.8 per 100 currently. This 2-day interactive online course complies with OSHA's general industry standards to help you earn your OSHA 10-hour course completion card (see requirements below). OSHA General Industry safety training has a twofold effect on your organization: employees will remain safe, healthy, in compliance and productive, while your organization will be less likely to incur fines, penalties, and legal action due to non-compliance.
